



The State of Homelessness in Vermont

2011 Annual Summary

The data used in this report was built upon The Vermont Balance of State Continuum of Care Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and Annual Point in Time (PIT) Surveys. The Nelson A. Rockefeller Center at Dartmouth College Center, a catalyst for public policy research has engaged with the Data Quality Management Council to develop this first Vermont Homeless report of it's kind. Collectively, Policy Research Shop students completed more than 300 hours of research and design work on this project.

The data represents the data collection of over 21,000 records of over 40 Vermont agencies that provide Shelter, Housing and Supportive Services to the most vulnerable in the state. This initial effort has been made to develop a basis for an unduplicated count, and to better understand the demographics of homelessness in Vermont. In time the expectation is to measure the patterns of homeless use; the effectiveness of services and to support improved collaboration among community partners serving homeless persons.

Projections from HMIS data for the total number of homeless are tentative by nature. The implementation is more mature in comparison to some communities outside the state of Vermont, however data quality continues to be a challenge for the Continuums of Care. In 2010 the Balance of State Continuum of Care developed and adopted a data quality management plan. This is demonstrating an increased focus on and maintenance of data quality. Results are promising.



One in Every 100 individuals is homeless


- There were about 7,180 homeless individuals who received homelessness assistance services from a surveyed provider in Vermont during 2010, about 1.15% of the total population in the state (626,367)
- This is a 52.2% increase from 2009 (4,719) and a 251% increase from 2008 (2,040)
- While this is a staggering change, it is important to remember that the collapse of the housing bubble and financial markets took place in 2008.
- 2009 also marked the beginning of the enactment of the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP), allowing for more individuals to receive services (program implementation and data collection started at the end of '09)


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2008 Breakdown by Age




- A large majority of homeless individuals in Vermont are under the age of 34
- The proportion of homeless individuals under the age of 34 increased from 62% in 2008 to 69% in 2010


2010 Breakdown by Age



MINORITIES

- Only 5% of the total Vermont population is classified as a minority, the demographics for homeless minorities is around 6%.
 - A Considerably larger portion of homeless are African American compared to the general demographics of VT
 - 60% of homeless minorities are African American compared to only 21% of total minorities in the state.

General Vermont Demographics: Minorities Only




- In 2008, Whites represented 93% (1,903) of all homeless individuals and 95% (596,419) of the total population.
- In 2009, Whites represented 93% (4,402) of all homeless individuals and 95% (590,050) of the total population
- In 2010, Whites represented 95% (6,809) of all homeless individuals and 95% (596,331) of the total population.
- In 2010, Whites represented 95% (6,809) of all homeless individuals and 95% (596,331) of the total population.


Number of Homeless Veterans in Vermont




- There was a 99% increase in homeless veterans from 2008 to 2010.

- There was a 25.90% increase of homeless with co-occurring disabilities from 2008 to 2010
- There was a 45% increase of homeless with a disability of long duration from 2008 to 2010

DISCLAIMERS

The participation rates for some local Continua is neither uniform nor consistent, this still poses a challenge, partly due to the number of homeless service coverage across the state and reluctance of some agencies to contribute data to the HMIS

Domestic Violence programs are not participating and are barred from participating due to the 2005 revisions to the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). This has posed challenges for reporting and therefore the homeless DV population is under reported.

Veterans rates are under represented as many veterans chose to avoid answering questions about their veteran status, also until the recent VA initiative to ensure VA data is included 2011.

Street Outreach program data is included and the outreach programs are very well represented in this data , however such outreach is not consistent across the state due to lack of programs in lower populated counties.

The federally funded Housing & Urban Development Homelessness Prevention & Rapid Rehousing program required data collection from many providers that were not collection data prior to 2009. This may have contributed to substantial increases portrayed.

Data from Chittenden and Franklin Counties may under represent actual numbers due to data systems compatibility issues. However much of the data utilized was from Community Health Care of Burlington, one of the primary street outreach programs in the county.

Some children may be under represented due to reduced data entry for families with multiple children during Point in Time counts.

Both the Vermont Balance of State and Chittenden Continuum of Care information reflects the above gaps, and is portrayed to estimate the degree to which the counts represent the totals.


This first report is intended as an initial count and thus, reflects the uncertainties associated with the limitations described above. The plan is for data to be updated on a monthly basis with the new data quality parameters in place. The expectation is for improvements in both methodology and coverage counts.

The data analysis was as follows:

De-identified aggregate data of homeless persons and households were extracted from the Balance of State HMIS system. This data is separated using the consumers (homeless persons) zip code of last permanent address to determine the county of residence, rather than the place of service.

Since data is aggregated and reported based on county of last residence, there is a degree of duplication throughout the reporting years as the homeless persons may have had residence in multiple counties. As mentioned, previously, the level of HMIS participation is somewhat inconsistent throughout the state. Using the last place of residence helped to alleviate this inconsistency. One notable exception is Chittenden County. The data presented from this community is primarily representative of the street outreach program.

Much of the data presented looks at the changes in homelessness from 2008 to 2010. Many factors affect the figures, not just a definite increase in homelessness throughout the years. Some of the primary factors are, greater agency participation, especially since the HPRP initiative beginning in 2009, some agencies including more homeless programs in HMIS, and more agencies seeing the value of contributing their data to the HMIS data system.



DEFINITIONS

Servicepoint: Health Management Information System (HMIS)

-Main data input system for Vermont, contains all data collected from the Continuum of Care for HUD.

Continuum of Care (CoC): The CoC is a community planning group charged with creating a community plan to organize and deliver housing services to meet the specific needs of people who are homeless as they move to stable housing and maximum self-sufficiency. The plan includes action steps to end homelessness. CoCs may organize around a city, and country or multiple counties. There are 13 CoCs in Vermont


Chronically Homeless: An unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition who has either been continuously homeless for a year or more OR has had at least four episodes of homelessness in the past 3 years. The individual must have been on streets or in an emergency shelter (not transitional housing) during 3 episodes

Person in Families : Includes the following constellation of persons living together: two-parent families, female single parent, male single parent, foster parents, couple (parent and friend) with children, grandparents and child, couple with no children and non-custodial care givers.

Individuals: Includes those clients who report that they are living alone as a single adult, as a couple without children or as an unaccompanied youth

At-risk: At-risk persons are those who do not meet the definition of homeless, but are experiencing a housing crisis. These include individuals who are temporarily living with family and friends due to a housing crisis and/or are spending 50 percent or more of their income on housing. The vast majority of these individuals are also poor.

Disabilities: Includes mental illness, drug abuse, alcohol abuse, dual diagnosis, physical/medical (chronic illness), physical/mobility, developmental, vision impaired, hearing impaired, HIV/AIDS, learning and others.

Data Summary

- Barre saw a 399% increase in homeless from 2008-2010, from 103 individuals to 514 individuals
- The increase in total individuals in families increased almost 1,040% from 2008 to 2010
- Zip codes 05641 and 05663 both saw significant increases in total homeless, 464% and 760% respectively.
- In Barre, homelessness increased among the disabled at a fairly consistent pace.
- Barre's homeless were most often staying with friends or family, or renting without a subsidy, before they became homeless.

Data Summary

- Bennington saw a 737% increase in homeless from 2008 to 2010, from 137 individuals to 1,148 individuals
- This increase is significantly higher than the statewide average.
- A large majority of homeless individuals (71%) are under the age of 34.
- The rate of disabled homelessness increased from 2008 to 2010. The increase in homelessness in the disabled population occurred mostly in the disabled population of long duration.
- About 69% of homeless individuals in Bennington came from zip code 05201.
- The steepest rate of growth in the homeless population of Bennington was among those who had previously rented a home.

Data Summary

- Brattleboro saw a 193% increase in homeless, from 304 in 2008 to 891 in 2010
- This is slightly lower than the statewide average.
- Individuals ages 17 and under saw the largest increase in homelessness, especially those in families (1892%)
- African Americans saw the largest increase in homelessness in Brattleboro, going from 4% of the total homeless population to about 6%.
- Zip code 05301 has the largest population of homeless individuals in Brattleboro
- The percent of homeless who were homeowners immediately before becoming homeless is higher in Brattleboro than in most parts of the state.

Data Summary

- Burlington saw a 22.1% increase in homeless, from 276 in 2008 to 337 in 2010
- This is significantly lower than the state-wide average.
