## METHODOLOGY

These findings are based on The Dartmouth Poll, a survey conducted by faculty and students affiliated with The Nelson A. Rockefeller Center for Public Policy and the Social Sciences at Dartmouth College. The survey responses were collected between Oct. 5 and Oct. 18, 2024 based upon interviews with 2,211 registered New Hampshire voters. Survey respondents were randomly selected from the New Hampshire voter file maintained by L2, a national supplier of processed and enhanced registered voter data for political, public affairs, and research use. Respondents were recruited to join an internet survey through a mail invitation postcard sent to addresses throughout the state.

The response rate for the survey was 2.1% based upon a formula from the American Association for Public Opinion Research (AAPOR RR3). The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/-2.1%. The margin of error for the congressional election results is larger, around 3.1%, due to the smaller sample sizes. The survey data were weighted based upon gender, age, education, partisanship, county, and congressional district geography to match the population characteristics of New Hampshire registered voters in 2024. The data were also adjusted for respondents' likelihood of voting based upon self-reported likelihood of voting, age, race, education, income, and past turnout. Substantive answer choices were rotated randomly for non-demographic questions.

The Dartmouth Poll was established in 2024 and conducts surveys periodically on elections, policy issues, and other topics. The research has no affiliation with any political candidate or campaign and has received no financial support from any political candidate or campaign. The survey project is funded by The Nelson A. Rockefeller Center for Public Policy and the Social Sciences at Dartmouth in Hanover, New Hampshire.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>i</sup> There were two versions of the right/wrong track question, one that had right direction followed by wrong track and another that had wrong track followed by right direction. The version for any given respondent was assigned randomly. However, due to a programming error, a random subset of respondents during the first two days that the survey was in the field may not have seen this question, so the number of cases is less for this question than for later questions.
